Frustrated with the never-ending cycle of UTIs?

If you suffer from chronic urinary tract infections (UTIs) and your provider has been ordering urine culture, it's possible that the treatment you've been prescribed hasn't been fully effective. Traditional tests may miss up to two-thirds of the organisms that cause UTIs.¹

There is a better option. Resolve mdx is an advanced UTI test that accurately identifies the bacteria or fungus and provides specific recommendations for targeted treatment.

Who would benefit from the test?

Ask your provider about getting the Resolve mdx test. They can collect a urine sample on your next office visit and send it for testing.

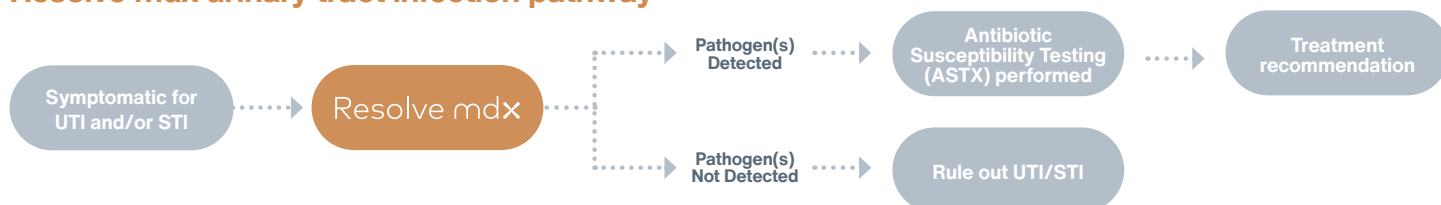
